

The Museum's annual Year in Review is always consequential, documenting as it does, a year of enormous activity and impact made in all areas of the Museum and Sea Center operations. But there can be no doubt that 2020 was a year like no other in the Museum's last several decades. And yet, despite the public health crisis that so vexed our community, our nation, and our world, the Museum and Sea Center carried out our mission both in person, when possible, and virtually, when necessary.

The year started off with our annual celebration of donors and friends at the Leadership Circles of Giving Dinner where we presented our Legacy Awards to the Hind Foundation, Joan Seaver Kurze, Ph.D., and Fred Schaeffer. Our spring gala Pollinators was another successful event raising \$450,000 for our education programs. The pandemic forced the shutdown of both the Museum and Sea Center in mid-March until July when we were able to open our outdoor areas to the public. With timed ticketing and social distancing rules in place, visitors were able to enjoy Prehistoric Forest and Butterflies Alive! Indoor exhibits opened at the end of the summer and we continued our social distancing rules.

Staff embraced the word "pivot" and created numerous virtual programming events for children and adults. The annual Santa Barbara Wine + Food Festival® was postponed along with several other scheduled events.

We had planned to begin important work on the Collections and Research Center in 2020, but postponed the Collections Care Project until 2021.

A few highlights of the year include Curator of Malacology Daniel L. Geiger, Ph.D., being awarded a National Science Foundation grant to catalog marine invertebrates, the installation of the animatronic dinosaurs for Prehistoric Forest, and endowing the Quasars to Sea Stars program with a major gift of \$500,000.

All in all, the Museum and Sea Center weathered the ups and downs of 2020, along with the rest of the world. I am proud to share that with community support, the guidance of the Board of Trustees, and dedicated staff, we came out of 2020 strong.


